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HUD's DEFINITION of CHRONICALLY HOMELESSLESS:

 Anyone who is an unaccompanied homeless individual with a disabling condition,

AND

 Has either been continuously homeless for a year or more,

or

 Has had at least four (4) episodes of homelessness in the past three (3) years.

Disabling Conditions

- Diagnosable substance use disorder
- Serious mental illness
- Developmental disability
- Chronic physical illness
- May include the co-occurrence of two or more of these conditions.
- A disabling condition is one that limits an individual's ability to work or perform one or more activities of daily living (ADL).



Intensive Case Management

- Complete a comprehensive assessment
- Obtain universal documents
- Develop an Individual Action Plan to address specific needs
- Complete appropriate referrals
- Direct individuals to community resources
- Complete the loop with regular followups



Housing coupled, with supportive services, helps the individual by:

- Providing a foundation for positive rehabilitation, independent living, and improved overall health
- Helping to prevent returning to homeless shelters, emergency rooms, or jails
- Establishing a cost-effective intervention from continuing destructive behaviors

Challenges of Keeping Chronically Homeless Persons Housed

NO "one-size-fits-all" approach

Build rapport

Meet client where s/he is at

• Resolve specific issues

- Address destructive behaviors
- Stablish a support network



- Know your community partners and maintain regular communication
- Maintain positive relationships with "Can Do" attitude
- Get involved in community meetings/trainings
